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YOUNG'S AND CHARLES WELLS COMBINE BREWING OPERATIONS

London brewer Young's is to combine its brewing operations with Charles Wells of Bedford to create a major new national force in the brewing industry. A new company, Wells & Young's Brewing Company Limited, which will begin operations in October, will brew all of Young's beers in Bedford alongside the Charles Wells brands. Wells & Young's will become one of the leading suppliers of speciality beers in Britain and one of the top three brewers of cask beer in the country, with two of the fastest growing national brands, Young's Bitter and Wells Bombardier English Premium Bitter.

The company will be owned 40 per cent by Young's and 60 per cent by Charles Wells, reflecting the assets being contributed by each shareholder, which for Charles Wells include the freehold land and production facilities of the Eagle Brewery. Wells & Young's will be operated as an independent private company, at arms length from its two shareholders. Both Young's and Charles Wells will continue to operate their pub estates independently of each other and both have entered into separate three-year rolling (five-year minimum) supply agreements with Wells & Young's. Young's wines and spirits subsidiary, Cockburn & Campbell, is to merge with the Charles Wells wine operation, Havelock Wines.

Negotiations for the sale of Young's Ram Brewery site, in the centre of Wandsworth, are at an advanced stage and it is hoped that part of the proceeds will be used to subscribe to shares in Wells & Young's. The Young's board will then be in a position to develop and increase its present estate of 205 pubs. The sale will allow Wandsworth Council to undertake much-needed regeneration of Wandsworth town centre. The development will incorporate some of the older brewery buildings, such as the Brewery Tap pub and Young's working beam engines – among the oldest of their type in the world – as well as some historic brewing equipment, all of which will remain on display to the public.

At the same time, Young's is moving some of its specialist brewing equipment and members of its brewing staff to Bedford, overseen by head brewer Ken Don, to ensure that its beers will continue to match the flavours and quality that have won the company well over 50 medals in major brewing competitions in the past 40 years.

Young's chairman John Young said: "This move will help to safeguard the future of Young's and greatly strengthen cask beer's overall position in the market. Charles Wells is a similar firm to Young's in so many ways. I have known Oliver Wells, president and former chairman of Charles Wells, for many, many years as part of a long-standing personal relationship between our two families.

"As we prepare to say goodbye to Britain's oldest brewery, founded in the reign of Elizabeth I and run by my family since 1831, we must avoid shedding tears and instead consider the advantages that our move will have.

"It will ensure that we remain a vertically integrated brewery, as will Charles Wells, producing our own beers for our own pubs – something we at Young's have long assured our shareholders that we would do."

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♦ The Budget

As usual, not much for the beer drinker... The budget saw the price of beer rise by 1 penny although, as ever, this has multiplied many times over when it comes to the point of sale. CAMRA had called for a freeze or small cut in excise duty on beer and cider as part of a longer term strategy to reduce duty rates on beer and cider. Duty on cider was frozen. CAMRA particularly criticised the Chancellor for increasing duty on beer but not on champagne.

◆ Progressive beer duty

Small Breweries' Relief means that small brewers pay less duty on the beer that they produce: under the current system all brewers producing below 60,000 hectolitres a year benefit. There have been calls by a number of the larger regional and family brewers, including Adnams, Charles Wells and Fuller's, for the relief to be scaled back because they say that the small brewers are using the savings to discount their beer instead of investing in company development. They want a 'level playing field' because they feel that they are caught between

the small brewers receiving the duty relief and the big boys who can discount because of their size.

CAMRA has responded with a campaign to extend the relief to 200,000 hectolitres. There are now 570 small and regional brewers compared to 440 when the measure was introduced in 2002. Extending relief would enable more brewers to benefit and would reduce the disincentive to growth for brewers just under the 60,000 hectolitre limit. CAMRA is lobbying MPs to sign a new parliamentary Early Day Motion supporting Small Breweries' Relief and calling for its extension. Thus far 47 MPs have signed the motion.

CAMRA Chief Executive Mike Benner said: "It is a sad fact that over 80% of the beer drunk in the UK is produced by four global brewers. Small Breweries' Relief is crucial in helping Britain's small and regional brewers compete against the huge economic muscle of the global brewers. Thirteen EU countries provide tax relief for small breweries producing up to 200,000 hectolitres annually and CAMRA is urging Britain to follow the lead of other beer loving nations such as Germany."



◆ Full pints

There is still no progress from the Department of Trade and Industry on the Food Orders. This legislation had been expected at the end of last year but has been delayed as regulations on packaged goods are being negotiated in Europe. There are lobby cards that CAMRA members can send to their MPs; see CAMRA's new look website. 241 MPs have now signed the Early Day Motion on Full Pints.

♦ Ban on glasses?

Another motion at the CAMRA AGM came from the Glasgow and Edinburgh Branches contesting a proposed ban on the use of glasses in pubs. By next January, in order to reduce supposed levels of violence, pubs will be required to use only plastic or toughened glass glasses. Glasgow's licensees feel that the general ban is unfair and that action should be specifically directed at the small number of pubs, and mostly clubs, where there are problems. The Chairman of Glasgow's Licensing Board, Mr Gordon Macdiarmid, reportedly simply called opponents 'ignorant' and said that objections were 'futile'.

The AGM motion was put in inimitable style by

CAMRA's Alistair Boyd (distinguished as the Greater before a second namesake emerged) who warned that whatever happens in Scotland can easily travel South, a warning that I feel we should take very seriously. It was a primary aim of the new legislation that problem outlets would be dealt with specifically and there would be no need for general measures like this.

Licensing laws

n interesting example of a Council exercising its powers under the new Licensing Act comes in from Watford Branch. As a result of the manager being done for drink driving, the pub being raided and various drugs and stolen goods being recovered from the clientele by the police, a pub in Watford has been ordered to be closed for 3 months. manager had allegedly had five warnings from the police about illegal activities at the pub. Punch, the owners, have been told to change the pub's name and informed that any one they put forward to run the pub will be subject to full vetting by the Council and the police. The pub, which hasn't done real ale for about 6 months, is currently adorned with metal shutters and a banner advertising the job vacancy within...

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

Community pubs inquiry

The Parliamentary Beer Group is holding an inquiry on community pubs. CAMRA has made a submission, the main points of which are that there should be a system of discretionary rate relief for community pubs, those running pubs should have the freedom to purchase one guest beer direct from a brewer of their choice, there needs to be a reduction in excise duty on draught beer and the government should introduce a requirement that any pub being sold should first be offered to the tenant or lessee for purchase.

♦ Smoking latest

The Welsh Assembly is considering introducing a smoking ban in advance of that due in England next summer, possibly before the end of this year. It will depend on the passing of the current Health Bill, expected in June. The Assembly's Health Minister feels that just two months consultation will be adequate to settle 'technical' issues such as the level of fines, required signage and defining 'outside areas'.

Meanwhile, possibly influenced by the riots over employment legislation, the government of France has postponed a proposed complete ban on smoking in favour of a 'vast consultation' – something akin, I presume, to a mass debate. The current, though widely ignored, rules require cafés and restaurants to have clearly separated smoking and non-smoking areas. The Green Party in France accused the government of cowardice and "sacrificing general interest for the wishes of lobby groups".

If you are wondering about the power of these lobby groups, British American Tobacco's profit for last year was £2.6 billion. Their view of the proposed smoking ban is that it is based on "an intolerant and paternalistic campaign to protect smokers from themselves, rather than meeting its stated objective of protecting the health of non-smokers".

♦ Fuller's news

London drinkers may be surprised to learn that CAMRA's recent Annual Conference (or Members' Weekend, as it is styled now) rejected an emergency motion put by the National Executive which condemned Gale's decision to sell out and called on Fuller's to maintain the current range of Gale's beers. There was no dispute as to the condemnation but the argument was that the production of "Gales" beers at Chiswick was not in line with existing policy. It will be interesting to see if, in line with CAMRA policy, the pumpclips for Chiswick-brewed Gales beers make its origins clear.

In the meantime, the former Managing Director of Gales, Nigel Atkinson, has joined the Fuller's board

as a non-executive director. He is also being retained as a consultant on the former Gales business and the Horndean site for three years.

Fuller's ESB won the Extra Special Bitter class at the 2006 World Beer Cup in Seattle in April, but then this was the beer that inspired the style! They also won first prize for their Vintage Ale in the Old Ale category. Other British gold medals went to Meantime Brewing of Greenwich, for a beer made with Fairtrade Rwandan coffee, and to Roosters Brewery in Knaresborough for its Yorkshire Pale Ale. John Keeling, Fuller's head brewer, said, "I think Fuller's, Meantime and Roosters have done a great job to further raise the profile of British beers in the US. You only need to take a look at some of the online communities to see how much interest there now is in exciting, complex beers. I was deeply honoured to be at the awards and incredibly proud to collect the two golds. The brewing team at Fuller's works very hard to ensure the quality and consistency of all our ales, so to come top in two categories, with an average of 26 entries in each, is a fantastic testament to their efforts."

◆ News from Shepherd Neame

Totally undeterred by its recent run-in with the Advertising Standards Authority, Sheps are at it again. They have launched a new series of cartoon strips as part of their advertising for Spitfire. Drawn by Viz cartoonist Graham Dury, in the style of the old adventure comics such as The Victor and Commando, 'The Road to Berlin' features a team of Tommies vying to win the World Cup for England this summer in Germany, including a less-thanfearsome Italian attack and a sneaky German supersub. The strips will appear in the sport section of the Evening Standard in addition to Spitfire's current back-page advertising campaign, which features copy lines such as 'Free pint for every Russian linesman'. Chief executive, Jonathan Neame said: "The strips are part of our continued investment in the Spitfire brand and its relation to major sports events." Politically incorrect and xenophobic or just a laugh? Down to personal tastes, I suppose.

There is more sensible news from Sheps however. Their bottled beer, Whitstable Bay (which I like) will be available on draught for the first time from the beginning of June. The 4.1% ABV beer will have new style pump clips featuring the strapline 'A modern ale from Britain's oldest brewer'. A light, refreshing ale, it is made from 100% natural ingredients including Kentish mineral water, East Kent Goldings hops and winter pearl malting barley.

Well, Sheps must be doing something right. Their profit in the half-year to the end of December rose 7% to £5.4 million on an increased turnover of £48.9 million (up 2.8%). A significant contribution came

from the 322-strong tenanted pub sector. Beer sales grew 2.6% by volume with Spitfire and Bishop's Finger prominent.

◆ Evening Standard Pub of the Year

This year's winner is the Clarence, 90 Balham High Street. It is described as a 'boutique' pub and is named after the owner's dog. It reopened in February this year - having previously been the Balham Arms – which made it ineligible for the next Good Beer Guide, but there is a commitment to real ale here so it is definitely 'one to watch'. It can be found on page 6 of the new local pub guide "Through the Gateway to the South".

◆ CAMRA Local Guide of the Year

On the subject of guides, congratulations to the organizing committee for the West London Pub Guide on their winning the 'Local Guide of the Year' award for 2006 at the CAMRA AGM. The original edition won the same award in 1989.

♦ Premium lagers

As the warm weather approaches, the advertising for lager brands hots up as well. At the CAMRA AGM it was agreed that we are opposed to the national and international branding of alcoholic products as this tends to brainwash gullible youth, to the detriment of the market for local and regional real ales. I will however just briefly mention the following.

Tusker (4.2%) is brewed in Kenya by East African Breweries Ltd (EABL), a subsidiary of Diageo. I note it for two reasons. First, EABL has a long history of supporting community initiatives in Africa and, through the EABL Foundation, commits 1% of pre-tax profit to community projects in East Africa. Second, it is named in memory of the brewery's founder George Hurst, who was killed by an elephant in 1923. There can't be many brewers who have come to that sort of end.

Also currently being relaunched is premium Japanese lager, Asahi ('Rising Sun'). As well as the usual methods, the campaign will feature rickshaw advertising. The 5% beer is described as being 'super crisp, super clear and super dry'. I mention it only because the furthest East it gets is Faversham in Kent where it is brewed by guess whom? Is it just me or is there something odd in Sheps poking World War II-based fun at the Germans but brewing a Japanese lager?

Just to complete the axis, SAB Miller are about to spend \$50 million promoting Italian lager, Peroni Nastro Azzurro. The new campaign will, apparently, "push the boundaries of traditional beer marketing", according to its International Brands

Director. Reinforcement of CAMRA's opposition to mass media advertising of alcohol is all the more timely.

◆ Award for St Peter's Brewery

St. Peter's Brewery, near Bungay, has won a Queen's Award for Enterprise (International Trade category) for overseas sales of its distinctive bottled beers. Managing Director, Colin Cordy, said, "Recently we were pleased to be named 'Drinks Exporter of the Year' by Food from Britain and to follow this up with the Queen's Award is an



enormous honour and thrill for all of us. Over 50% of our total production is now exported. We trade in seventeen countries and have a strong presence in USA, Canada, Scandinavia, Russia and Japan.

Our award winning English Ale, a fully hopped ale using all organic materials, is a top seller in the US, while Honey Porter is a favourite in Finland and Cream Stout is popular in Russia. Exports have increased by 83% in the last two years"

♦ Spot the £3 pint

Following on from the budget increases, I was surprised recently, on a London Pubs Group crawl in central London, that beer prices were better than I was expecting. I would be interested however in hearing from any reader who comes across a pint of real ale in a 'normal' pub that costs £3 or more. ♦ Last blast from Horndean

The Trafalgar in South Wimbledon, a long-standing outlet for Gales HSB, has sold its last batch of Horndean-brewed beer. To commemorate this, David Norman, the guv'nor, decided to offer it for sale at £100 per pint. He said: "This is the last of the Hampshire HSB, and so many people want some that we thought we'd offer them the chance to pay a special price for the privilege. Regulars will have the chance to buy £2.50 vouchers enabling them to buy a pint at the normal £2.50 price but anyone who comes in to buy a £100 pint will be glad to know they'll be

helping the Stroke Association - our chosen charity this year - to the tune of £97.50." I will let you know how much was raised next issue.

Needless to say, this does not need to be reported in the £3+ exercise.

♦ This rings a bell - or two

From the legal advice column of the Publican, I note that Schedule 1 to the Licensing Act 2003 specifically exempts Morris Dancing from being a licensable activity. There you go, Morris Dancing is not legally entertaining...

◆ and finally...

any of our beer-drinking colleagues from other European countries come to London to help staff the Great British Beer Festival (Earl's Court this year, don't forget). Somehow, someone working in a bar in Kristiansund managed to connect a cask of beer to the building's water pipe and a lady in a flat two floors above found herself doing her washing up in beer. Unfortunately, she reported, it tasted a bit odd and was flat. With beer at £5 a pint, I think that she should have been grateful.

the fall and rise of a community pub

Welcome to the Bricklayer's Arms. Reopened for a year now, the oldest pub in Putney is firmly back on the map. Built in 1826 on the site of an old coaching house and blacksmith's forge, it was licensed to sell beer and cider after the Duke of Wellington's Beer Act. Being so close to the river, the Waterman's Arms, as it was then known, was frequented mostly by the Thames Freemen and Lightermen. At the end of the 19th century, it became the Bricklayer's Arms, with the massive amount of construction taking place in the area due to the extension of the railway line. Builders would meet at the pub to be given work and also to be paid. There were three sections, each with separate doors: one for off-sales, one for the bosses and another where the brickies relaxed.

Readers may remember the pub as it was a century later, the long, cluttered room retaining the historic snob screens all round the bar and the gents' urinal serving as a customary repository for unwanted bronze coins. An Inntrepreneur tenancy, it had seen better days and, despite offering a choice of real ales, it was losing business. In 2000 it had a makeover, parading as the Putney Brick and with Adnams Broadside and Greene King IPA replacing what was left of the previous beer range, but its owners closed it soon afterwards with a view to sale for redevelopment of the site. Souvenir hunters helped themselves to the sign, the decorations and most of the fittings. The pub was no more, or so people thought then.

Becky runs it now. She takes up the story.

In 2002, the pub was bought at auction by my brother-in-law, John, and sister Helen. Auction room catalogues were crammed full of lovely old pubs deliberately run down and being sold off to property developers to convert to flats or demolish completely. Helen and John had lived in the area most of their lives and did not want this to happen. They loved the quirkiness of the building, the creaky feel of its age and the unpretentious atmosphere which starts to rub off on you the moment you walk in through the door. For about six months they reopened the pub with Taylor's Landlord and sometimes a guest beer, but the familiar features had gone and so, by then, had the regulars. Instead, for a few years it became the most wonderful family home where they raised their two young sons.

Tragically and unexpectedly Helen died in January 2005, leaving us all completely stunned. John and I decided to reopen the pub immediately to generate income to support the boys, then aged six and seven. I laugh when I think back to it now but, having never even worked behind a bar before, I threw open the doors for business at twelve noon on Boat Race Day. It was phenomenal, terrifying, a pure baptism of fire; but it was also a huge success and we decided to


make a real go of it. At first we just opened up at weekends while I wound up my own career but by May we were in full swing.

It's a tough call in Putney. Surrounded by corporate chains, the Bricklayer's Arms is a small fish in a very big pond and it has been a day-to-day struggle to survive; taking licensing exams, learning the trade on our feet and getting physically used to the long hours of the hardest work I have ever known. Again I laugh now but it was almost by chance that I discovered that the biggest changes in licensing law to happen to this country since the 1960s was about to come into being last year. Not only did I have to transfer the existing licence to my name but I also had six weeks to familiarise myself with the new law, a twenty-two page monster, and also to make the necessary applications and adjustments that other licensees had had two years to think about. I will be eternally grateful to Sergeant Ian McKenna, then head of licensing at Wandsworth Police Station, for talking me down off the ceiling on several occasions when my stress levels were sliding off the map. He sat patiently with me for hours tutoring me and writing 'to do' lists with me – pure comedy sketch.

We are immensely proud of what we have achieved so far in the circumstances and, even on the dark days we've had, we fully realise how lucky we are to have this opportunity. Being a free house we can sell what we like, and what we like is Timothy Taylor's real ale! Family connections with this divine brewery at Knowle Spring in Keighley have enabled us to work closely with their wonderful team.. I recently visited them all up there and was treated to an extensive tour by Peter Eels, the head brewer. Step by step he took me through their fascinating brewing process. I shall never forget the smell of those huge vats of Landlord, frothing away like giant shepherd's pies, nor the thorough tasting session in the cellar afterwards.

Our aim here at the Bricklayer's Arms is simply to create a really good, independent pub, with pub grub as it should be, (there won't be an olive oil drizzled sun dried tomato in sight, I promise); real, roaring log fire, friendly service, where the chances are you'll be served by the people actually running the place; and a cosy and a relaxed atmosphere to escape the rat race. We are a genuine family-run pub - a rare breed nowadays.

We still have a long way to go. Old buildings are expensive to maintain and the down side of our independence of course is that we have no corporate financial backing. However, we're not that bothered about this because we are passionate about what we're trying to achieve. There are no plans to rip out the old bar to maximise profits, no plans to bombard our customers with advertising at every level, no

plans to replace the oldest shove ha'penny board in Putney and the bar skittles with gambling machines; in short there are no plans to be modernised, sterilised or themed.

Wine bars are great but we detect a bit of a backlash in the air, a hankering for a return to the atmosphere of the real locals' local, providing a community service at a time when pubs seem to receive nothing but bad publicity. Added to this, John and I, being family and having been through so much together, are absolutely united in striving for a common purpose. We actually genuinely get on with one another and don't suffer the headaches of hierarchical management structures that can, and often do, destroy perfectly good pubs.

Response from the customers so far has been fantastic. The South West London branch of CAMRA recently met here and gave us the thumbs up, (although I'm surprised some of them could even find their thumbs after the amount of Ram Tam they supped that night). Peter Eels also repaid my visit to

Yorkshire by coming in to see if we were serving his beer correctly! It was an experience which frightened me nearly half to death but he also gave us the firm nod of approval, which was a wonderful morale booster.

John and I feel tremendously optimistic about the Bricklayer's Arms. As word gets out, sales are going up consistently and we know we're on to something good here. To celebrate our first successful year of business we are offering a pint of Timothy Taylor's for £2.00 to anyone who brings in a copy of this magazine. We are currently serving Landlord, Golden Best, Best Bitter and Ram Tam. We also have Budvar, Leffe and San Miguel on tap, together with a good selection of wines and spirits. For more information, or even just for a game of our famous 'virtual shove ha'penny', visit our website on www.bricklayers-arms.com. We look forward to meeting you soon.

BEXLEY'S FIRST BEER FESTIVAL

Bexley's first beer festival, over the weekend of 21-23 April, had a total of 842 customers through the door and ran out (all but three pints of Adnams) at 11pm on the Saturday night. The first cask to go was Hanby's Cherry Bomb on Friday night. Next to fall was Little Scotney Ale (usually only available in bottle), brewed by Westerham, our glass sponsors.

The festival commemorated the 50th anniversary of the demise of Bexley's major brewery, Reffells. The brewery in Bourne Road, Bexley, was built by Henry Reffell in 1874. Ten years later it was handed over to his sons Arthur and William who renamed it Reffell Brothers until 1898 when it became Reffells Bexley Brewery Ltd. In 1899 the London pubs of Showells (Oldbury, Birmingham) were bought. The brothers retired in December 1900 and the family connection with the business ended.

The brewery struggled and between October 1903 and August 1904 it was run under the direction of a receiver appointed by the debenture-holders. Thankfully it was saved by Percy Waistell, who first became Head Brewer then Managing Director and eventually Chairman in June 1925. In 1910 Reffells took over Burrows Cray Brewery of St Mary Cray and, in 1931, the Hampstead Brewery of Hampstead High Street, NW3.

From 1909 to 1928 the brewery's bottled beers won many Brewers Exhibition awards for IPA, brown and stout. Unfortunately in April 1944 Percy Waistell died but his son John, who joined the firm in 1927, carried on the good work of his father and was Managing Director when the brewery closed. On 8 June 1956 a general meeting was held to consider an offer from Courage Barclay of Southwark. The shareholders agreed to sell and John Waistell resigned.

Along with the brewery went around twenty pubs plus a number of off-licences. Some of the former Reffells pubs are still trading; the Volunteer, Church Road; Kings Arms, Bexleyheath Broadway; the Woolwich, Blackfen; Crayford Arms, Crayford and the Alma, Sidcup. Most of the brewery site is now used as the Old Bexley Business Park where many of the buildings retain old brewery names. The brewery's logo – in common with some other Kent brewers – was Invicta, the white horse of Kent. This was incorporated into the beer festival's logo accordingly.

Organiser, Alan Bockes thanks everyone who supported the festival, either as a drinker or a worker, for making it such a resounding success. 



Formed in 1997, Cask Marque is an independent accreditation scheme jointly funded by participating brewers and retailers, which recognises excellence in the service of cask ale. The award is made not to the pub but to the licensee, who has to pass two unannounced inspections with assessors sampling up to six beers checking temperature, appearance, aroma and taste. inspections are made twice a year, with additional random inspections triggered by customer comment. 

This time we welcome a new real ale outlet at Paddington Station conveniently close to the platforms. We record a number of new bars opened across the Capital but few offer real ale. Two more former Wetherspoon pubs have been renamed 'Misty Moon' by new owners Heart Vale. The small number of pubs in London run by provincial family brewers has been reduced still further by the closure of two Shepherd Neame pubs in EC1 Smithfield and Richmond, the latter being sold delicensed. Punch are disposing of recently acquired Spirit pubs whose managers turn down tenancy deals, and it is feared many may be vulnerable to developers eager to convert them

for other uses. Sadly M&B is removing cask ale from its 'All Bar One' estate and has withdrawn from the Cask Marque scheme those ABOs that had been accredited.

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



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LAGRAD LONDON GROUP

LONDON FOR FREE - MORE POUNDS TO SPEND ON BEER

AN UPHILL CLIMB

Highgate is full of places to explore; some are free, while others have an admission fee. Take your pick. Both Walking Village London by Andrew Duncan and Walking Literary London by Roger Tagholm have satisfying, educational walks around Highgate. Some of the highlights of both, plus some findings of my own, are described in this article.

Either Archway Tube or Highgate Tube will get you to your starting point. Wear sturdy walking shoes, carry an A-Z, and enjoy your invigorating walk, part of which is up a steep hill, and drink a pint or two of beer at the recommended pubs.

Our first visit is to Waterlow Park and Lauderdale House (020-8348 8716), built in 1580 and now an arts and education centre, set in 26 acres of public land, donated as a 'garden for the gardenless'. Check to see if any events are going on at Lauderdale House, built as the country house of a London goldsmith. Eventually, it was owned and later then given to the public in 1889 by Sir Sydney Waterlow, a Lord Mayor of London and printing firm head.

After strolling through the park, head for the famous Highgate Cemetery, burial ground to over 167,000 people. (Swain's Lane, N6; Archway (northwest) or Highgate (south) - 7 minutes walk from each). Swain's Lane bisects the two parts of the cemetery, which is the final resting place of at least 850 notable people, according to www.londontown.com, including '18 Royal Academicians, 6 Lord Mayors of London and 48 Fellows of the Royal Society'. Also among the notables are Karl Marx, whose enormous bust looms over the visitor; George Eliot; and Sir Ralph Richardson, all buried in the newer Eastern Cemetery (£1 admission; £2 guided tour). In the Victorian Western Cemetery, the admission is £3, but well worth the hour-long guided tour to see the Lebanon Circle Vaults, the Egyptian Avenue, the Terrace Catacombs, and the Julius Beer Mausoleum, along with some of the 100 different species of wildflowers and trees, 50 species of bird, 18 species of butterfly and perhaps the resident colony of foxes. www.highgate-cemetery.org information; the web site is maintained by a volunteer group, Friends of Highgate Cemetery, who restored the crumbling, overgrown grounds in the 1980s. The cemetery, which was one of seven authorized by Parliament in the early 19th century, was created in the 1830s, then expanded to the east across the road in 1854. The western side boasts among its notables Christina Rossetti; her sister-inlaw Lizzie Siddall, whose body was ordered exhumed by Dante Gabriel Rossetti to retrieve his only copy of his poems which he had buried with his

wife; and scientist Michael Faraday. If you want to see Lizzie's grave, you must apply in advance, as it is not accessible on the guided tour. The graves of Charles Dickens's parents and one of his daughters also need special permission to visit. Inspiration strikes in odd places, and supposedly Bram Stoker took his in part from Highgate Cemetery when he wrote Dracula. The cemetery continues to interest people, including author Tracy Chevalier (Girl With a Pearl Earring), whose novel Falling Angels is set in and near a cemetery very like Highgate. In the novel, one of the characters claims, 'the place itself. . has a lugubrious charm, with its banks of graves stacked on top of one another—granite headstones, Egyptian obelisks, Goths spires, plinths topped with columns, weeping ladies, angels, and of course, urns—winding up to the hill to the glorious Lebanon cedar at the top'. If this doesn't make you want to take the guided tour of the Western Cemetery, nothing will!

Time for a beer! Walk to the Flask, a famous pub near the cemetery, for liquid refreshment (77 Highgate West Hill, N6; 020-8348 7346; Tube: Archway or Highgate). The historic pub is located across from 3, The Grove, where Samuel Taylor

Coleridge lived with his personal physician Dr. Gillman and his family for 19 years, dying in Highgate and being buried for a while in the chapel; perhaps STC was a patron here. Legend has it that highwayman Dick Turpin spent time in the cellar to escape his pursuers. Hogarth was a regular here who knew about the evils of gin and the benefits of beer, as seen in his drawings. The pub has undergone a refurbishment, much to the chagrin of some customers, who think its charm has been destroyed. Decide for yourself.

Having quaffed a pint or two, head across the street to St. Michael's Church (South Grove, N6), where Coleridge and his wife are now buried. As stated above, Coleridge was originally buried in Highgate Chapel when he died in 1834, but his remains were interred in St. Michael's in 1961. Rumour has it that he and Sara are buried in the crypt, not under the marker in the church floor. After leaving the church, walk across the road to view 3, The Grove, Coleridge's last residence.

Pick from among several things to do for the rest of your day in Highgate:

Take a 4-mile Dickens walk (see www.london-walks.co.uk/44/london-walks-highgate-dic.shtml to print out your route), which follows many fictitious characters (David Copperfield and his wife, Dora, among them) as well as historical people. Dickens himself resided here (Is there any part of London in which Dickens did NOT reside and/or drink?). The information given for this walk is very readable, and the directions are clear.

Spend some time in Highgate Wood or Queen's Wood (Huswell Hill Road, W6) The former consists of 70 acres of ancient woodland with nature trail, playgrounds, nature hut, and a vegetarian café, which is closed on Mondays.

Stroll by Witanhurst (41 Highgate West Hill, N6), London's second largest privately owned home (after Buckingham Palace). It was completed in the early 1920s on 5.5 acres, with 65 rooms, and is now valued at between £35 and £42 million. The BBC

Visit Marlow with Bob Inman on the Travel Pages at www.londondrinker.org.uk filmed 'Fame Academy' here, and *The Lost Prince* included some interiors of the house. Recent neighbours have included Sting, Boy George, and George Michael.

After completing one of the above activities, head for the Gatehouse (1 North Road, N6; 020-8340 8054; Highgate Tube), a Wetherspoon's pub. There has been a pub on this site since 1337, and the word is that the ubiquitous Dick Turpin hid in a secret cupboard here. The walls are decorated with prints and photos of characters and scenes of Highgate. According to customers,'real ales are normally very well kept'. The CAMRA North London Full Pint' has an article on pub preservation at the historic Gatehouse, once the site of a toll house. Read it at: www.camranorthlondon.org.uk/fullpint/fp0409.htm l The theatre company, 'Upstairs at the Gatehouse', performs at 'the top of London' - the highest theatre above sea level in the area.

Having walked many miles and satisfied your taste buds with decent beer and perhaps a meal, walk down the hill and rest your weary legs.

Nik Wood (letters, LD, April & May) raises some interesting points about a perceived need to introduce more young people to the merits of real ale. However, I am so appalled by the anti-social behaviour of most young people in pubs that I wonder: why bother? Pearls before swine.

I allowed myself a wry smile at Mr Wood's praise for Wetherspoon's 'bring your own atmosphere' approach. In my experience, this translates as raucous, boorish antics by groups of youngsters intent on replicating the 'atmosphere' of Newcastle's Bigg Market on a Friday night. In my local Wetherspoon's, the staff, who are no more civilised or responsible than the frightful chavs they serve, set an abject example by barely acknowledging your order, bawling inanities amongst themselves, leaving tables uncleared and unwiped, lobbing empty bottles noisily into the dumpster, etc. I find a couple of hours in Wetherspoon's an alarming and thoroughly depressing experience.

It is increasingly difficult to find a pub anywhere in which the drinker isn't assaulted by noise and subjected to loutish behaviour. In a local free house, a GBG regular, the young bar staff seem to think that a perfunctory raise of the eyebrows is a sufficiently polite gesture to elicit your order. (Even worse, in an execrable bar at London Bridge station, I was once wordlessly pointed at by the snip of a barman, presumably a cue for my order.) Back in the free house, a young barmaid recently seemed to find the task of chalking a couple of beer names on a blackboard impossible without a running commentary of foul-mouthed invective. ("How the fuck d'you spell Bombardier?")

This casual rudeness by staff is a shocking British phenomenon. Most of our young bar staff would be sacked within the hour in a country such as the United States where service is delivered with courtesy and pride.

And so, in defiance of Mr Wood's assertion, what the pub trade needs is not a new generation of real ale drinkers, but a new generation of properly behaved young adults. Until then, it is no wonder that an increasing number of older folk choose to drink at home.

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CROYDON CRAWLING (AND BUSSING)

East Croydon Station recently featured prominently in a list of dangerous and unsafe stations at night and the centre of Croydon is a typically charmless identikit town to a large extent, but there are some fine pubs – if you know where to find them.

A bright Wednesday morning sees me outside the Dog & Bull (Young's) in Croydon's Surrey Street Market at opening time. This pub is a Croydon institution and is a must on any pub crawl of the area. It's a current GBG pub and the Young's Ordinary at £2.30 is in splendid form. As I'm sitting there supping my pint, the only sound is of the market stallholders outside exhorting people to buy their fruit and veg. The coloured leaded windows depicting both a dog and a bull add to the fine atmosphere of this little changed local. Prince Charles visited this pub in 1995 and photographs of the occasion are proudly displayed on the wall. An extension was added to the right hand side (sometime in the mid 1990s I think), but it blends in seamlessly with the original part of the pub. Three or four locals come in at around 11.15 am but unfortunately the bar staff seem to have temporarily disappeared. Good humoured sarcastic comments abound - " never mind, Dave's on at 12 o ' clock " and it's a good 15 minutes before staff reappear. It's a simple misunderstanding: each of the two staff on duty thought the other was behind the bar, which is accepted with good grace by the friendly (and no doubt thirsty) locals. There are some interesting pictures of Croydon in olden days on the walls, including one of the Fox & Hounds in West Croydon in 1907 showing the pub as owned by the City of London Brewery. London Drinker was on sale in this CAMRA friendly pub, as was the St George's Ale. Roger Protz summed it up perfectly in an early CAMRA London Pub Guide, Young's turn it into a wine bar called Johnnies, I shall emigrate".

Not too far away, under the flyover in nearby Sheldon Street, is another of Croydon's gems, the Royal Standard (Fuller's). This was one of the original dozen or so Fullers pubs that remained on real ale back in the days when Fuller's commitment to the real thing was considerably less than it is now. It's a cosy back street local with an outside drinking area across the road that affords a splendid view of the flyover and a rather large and ugly multistorey car park. On display in the bar is a cricket bat signed by players from Surrey County Cricket Club in 2002, when they played at nearby Whitgift School. The Royal Standard is another current GBG listing. I did note that the pub displayed not the London Drinker, but a local guide of where to go in Croydon, "Wired" in the CAMRA Magazine holder on the shelf in the bar. The London Pride at £2.55

was in fine form.

It's a short bus ride away to South Croydon and our next port of call, the Swan & Sugar Loaf. This is a local landmark, a prominent building situated on a fork bend in the main road which still proudly displays Page and Overton's Ales lettering high up at the front of the building. This pub is listed in the London Regional Inventory Outstanding Pub Interiors, its main feature being three stained glass panels depicting swans and a sugar loaf above a former snug bar which features an unusual fixed seating arrangement around an old fireplace. The large single bar displays two sets of two handpumps, but with no pump clips anywhere, even on the bar back, and hence no indication or reference to any real ale being on sale. The welcome from the bar staff could perhaps be described as muted and unenthusiastic and I don't feel inclined to enquire about the availability or otherwise of real ale. Entering a well known landmark pub such as this should simply be a much better all round experience than it is. Apart from the previously mentioned snug bar, the pub feels rather characterless and unwelcoming. A quick Guinness and it's time to move on.

Slightly further south, almost opposite Whitgift School, is Junction Road, a quiet residential street where the **Crown & Sceptre** (Fuller's) is easily found. This is a pleasant but otherwise unremarkable traditional pub with an excellent pint of Pride at only £2.35. There seems to be a good lunchtime food trade from nearby offices and, in marked contrast to the previous pub, friendly and cheerful staff.

Also in Junction Road, on the street corner is the Earl of Eldon, an old style traditional pub formerly owned by Charringtons in days long gone, but now one of the seemingly numerous Greene King pubs that can now be found throughout the Home Counties. There is a pool table in one corner of the bar and a juke box with all the old 60s and 70s favourites on it. I won't reopen the debate about Greene King IPA, suffice it to say that my pint was instantly recognisable as being that beer.

In the next street, Upland Street, is another quiet traditional pub, Jack Beard's at the Woodman. Jack Beard must have been out when we called; although we're bang in the middle of the lunchtime period, the sullen barmaid had only three customers and a rather large, unfriendly looking dog for company. Beers on were the ubiquitous London Pride and Greene King IPA, hardly an imaginative selection, but the London Pride was spot on. This is a pleasantly decorated pub, probably losing custom to the previously mentioned Crown and Sceptre, due to the latter offering food.

CROYDON CRAWLING (AND BUSSING)

Returning by bus into West Croydon takes us to our next stopping off point, the Tamworth Arms. This is a small single bar Young's pub now on a main Tramlink route. The pub has a fine green tiled exterior. Inside, not much seems to have changed since my first ever visit to this pub in the early 70s. The pub was closed for some considerable period of time during the Tramlink construction and it was thought at one time that it might never reopen; happily this has proved not to be the case. It's predominantly a quiet, locals' pub, as it always seems to have been. There's a rare sighting of a bar billiards table. On the wall are several old pictures of the Bull, a former Young's pub in nearby Mitcham that closed its doors for the last time several years ago. Enquiries reveal that the current tenants of the Tamworth Arms used to have this pub previously. The Ordinary is on moderate form.

In nearby London Road, quite close to West Croydon station, is the Fox & Hounds. This is the pub whose picture I noted on the wall of the Dog & Bull. Like the Earl of Eldon, the Fox & Hounds is now owned by Greene King and we decide to give it a miss.

A bit further out of Croydon, just off the main London Road, in Longley Road is the Princess Royal. This is another fine traditional pub with a friendly welcoming atmosphere. Horse brasses and the like create a real country pub feel, somewhat incongruous given its actual location in what can only be described as a rather grim area of Croydon. It's now a free house, although I believe it was previously owned by G**** K***. (I'll leave you to fill in the gaps). On the beer front, this visit was notable for a rare sighting of Banks Original. Banks hails from Wolverhampton where, for the benefit of those who have never been to that part of the world, it's pronounced "bonks". The pub is another GBG regular, a bit off the beaten track, but well worth seeking out.

Well, that's all for now. I hope to feature some more of Croydon's pubs in a later article.


